

Embrace Action (EA) Vision – Executive Summary

Fairlawn’s EA Vision Statement: Fairlawn will be actively engaged in promoting positive social and economic change to those in need in our world, with our ultimate goal to support a just and sustainable world.

The Fairlawn Approach to EA: Embracing Action at Fairlawn means that we step out of our silos and are enriched by getting to know those who are marginalized and whose Voice has been silenced. This experience engages our hearts, challenges stereotypes and moves us to learn about why some of our neighbours live in poverty. From this comes a desire to advocate for systemic change that will make poverty a thing of the past.

External Goal (5 year focus): Strive to eradicate poverty.

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Internal Goals:

- i. Fairlawners will become more actively involved:
 - a. Congregants will have an opportunity to live their faith and respond to God’s calling as a Christian community.
 - b. Participation will provide the opportunity to be transformed – to break barriers and dispel stereotypes about those who are marginalized and living in poverty.
 - c. Relationships between congregants will be strengthened.
- ii. Newcomers will be inspired to join us. Fairlawn will be seen as a place where they can help to create a just and sustainable world.
- iii. Stronger relationships will be built between Embrace Action programs. Volunteers from different programs will have the opportunity to learn from and be inspired by each other.
- iv. Each EA program will have defined goals and objectives.
- v. The profile of each program will be raised in such a way as to draw more talent and financial support for the work that we do.

2017 Focus:

- i. Expand our current programs by getting more people involved and by increasing funding where able. Programs will be continuously reviewed and adapted as needed.
- ii. Develop new EA programs according to the interests and energy of the congregation. They will be rated by how well they meet the key external goal of addressing poverty in some way and the five internal goals stated above.
- iii. Focus our Embrace Action spending on Fairlawn’s in-house EA programs and on external agencies engaged in poverty work.
