American composer Mark Hayes' *Requiem* (2014) combines the traditional with 21st century expression. It looks to the eternal with hope and glorious musical vision, incorporating compositional techniques such as fugal development, chant-like sections, mixed metre, percussive rhythms and elegant melodies that truly illuminate the sacred text. Fairlawn Avenue Senior Choir has had the privilege of presenting the Canadian premiere of two of Mark's other major works at past Special Music Sundays – *Gloria* (2010) and *Magnificat* (2015).
